A neighborhood project in this sense can be something small. For example you could organize a group of your neighbors to clean up an alley. Or you could begin to establish a group of residents that want to plan and put on a neighborhood event. Or you could design and facilitate a meeting of your neighbors to determine what their concerns might be too. Part of “Neighborhood Photojournalism” class will provide some examples and ideas for projects that you might want to consider if you don’t have one in mind.
