There is no cost for your participation. Financial support for the Neighborhood Institute is generously provided by the Metro United Way and by individual members of the Louisville Metro Council.



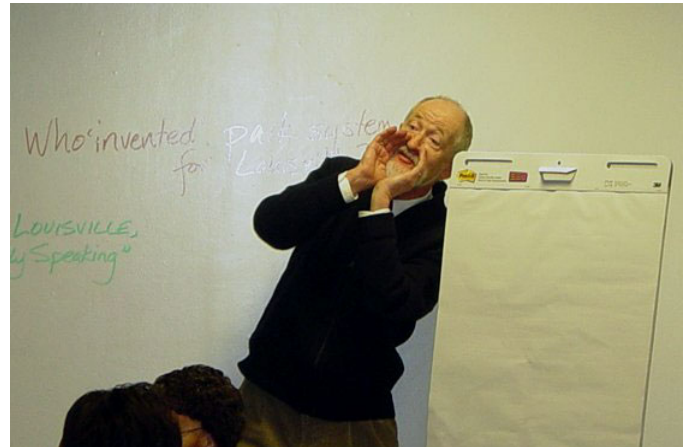

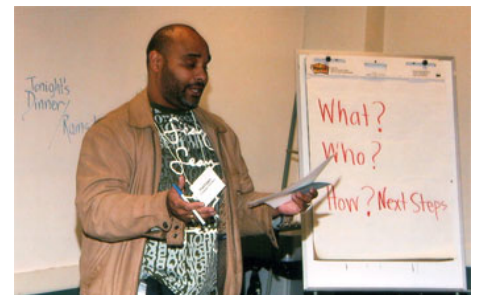
Issues covered
